Are You Interested in Running for City Council?

The following Troutdale City Council positions are up for election at the November 8, 2016 General Election:

Mayor • Council Position #2 • Council Position #4 • Council Position #6

Do I qualify? How long is the term of office? What is the filing deadline?

If you are interested in running for Troutdale City Council, you must be a registered voter who has resided in the City of Troutdale during the six months immediately preceding the election. A person may be a candidate for only one (1) office to be filled during a single election. All positions are 4-year terms beginning January 1, 2017, through December 31, 2020. All successful candidates are required to file an Annual Verified Statement of Economic Interest form as required by ORS 244.050.

All completed nominating petitions must be filed with the City Recorder **no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 30, 2016.**


Where am I? The 97060 zip code can be confusing.

Sometimes it might be difficult to put your foot correctly on the boundary line of a city, but maps can help aid you in correctly identifying political boundaries and determining what City your property actually resides within. Who is a resident of the City of Troutdale, and who is not, can sometimes be confusing if based on the wrong information. Typically throughout the year, the City receives phone calls from realtors and citizens who use the postal zip code to "identify" an address as being in Troutdale. Although this can be correct, it is not always the case.

The postal zip code is established by the US Postal Service (USPS) to assist in the sorting of mail for specific postal service areas that do not necessarily correspond to political boundaries. The City of Troutdale is almost entirely contained within the 97060

service area and is home to the Troutdale Post Office that services that zip code. Yet the 97060 code also includes parts of Wood Village and a fairly large swath of unincorporated Multnomah County to the south and east. This has occasionally resulted in confusion and consternation over which City a person lives in, and whom to call for services such as water, sewer, street maintenance and trash.

In some cases, additional confusion has resulted from the USPS method of bulk mail distribution. The Troutdale Champion is distributed in bulk by postal service route. Within 97060, there are a number of delivery routes. Some routes cross over into parts of Wood Village and unincorporated areas, and as a result some Wood Villagers and rural residents receive this City of Troutdale newsletter,

which has led some of them to assume they live in Troutdale. A recent example is the unfortunate confusion over who was included in Troutdale's new curb-side bulky waste collection event advertised in this newsletter. If you receive this newsletter, check to make sure you are actually a Troutdale resident before assuming that you are eligible to receive a particular service offered to City of Troutdale residents. Check your utility bill, look up your property on available maps, or contact the City to confirm.

The City of Troutdale Geographic Information System (GIS) staff is always available to help you find yourself. The GIS staff can be reached directly Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., at 503-674-7245, or at gis@troutdaleoregon.gov.

Coming soon to Troutdale:

Internet Purchase Exchange Location

Don't want to give strangers your address when you buy or sell goods online? You can soon make your exchange in a safe environment.

The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office, Troutdale Public Safety Advisory Committee and the City of Troutdale are providing an "Internet Purchase Exchange" location at the Troutdale Police Community Center located at 234 SW Kendall Court.

The signs will be posted in early July at or near the front parking lot to provide a location to exchange your great buys which have been negotiated online. With the location of the sign being in a close proximity to the police station, access to Law Enforcement is available 24/7. We will post the location on the City of Troutdale's webpage once this project is completed. *Happy Bargain Hunting!*



Are We Qualified?

Our Public Works employees are highly qualified in making sure your water is safe to drink and systems are in compliance with all federal and state regulations.

The short answer is, yes we are! There's been a lot in the news lately about water quality. We at the City of Troutdale Public Works Department would like you to know that we have highly qualified and dedicated professionals working to ensure that your drinking water is clean and safe.

Oregon Drinking Water Services (DWS) administers the certification program for drinking water system operators. Trained and certified operators are necessary to ensure that water systems are managed in a manner that fully protects public health and the environment.

Water distribution systems are classified according to the population served, and require operators be certified as Levels 1 through 4. The City of Troutdale is required to staff a level 3 Water Distribution Operator and to have an operator of this level to be in direct responsible charge of the water system.

In order to qualify for the State of Oregon-administered 100 question exam that covers all aspects of water distribution system operation, operations staff are required to prepare through training, education, and experience specific to the water system and provide an affidavit to prove this for each level of exam. Below is a list of requirements that must be met in order to qualify for an exam at each respective level.

Level Requirements:

1. HS/GED and 1 year experience - OR – A 2-year Associate's Degree in Water Technology may be substituted for 6 months experience. No other education or substitution will be credited for this level;
2. HS/GED and 3 years' experience – OR – 1 year relevant post-high school education and 2 years' experience;
3. HS/GED and 8 years of operating experience with 2.5 years of Operational Decision Making – OR - HS/GED, 1 year relevant post-high school, and 5 years' experience, with 2.5 years of Operational Decision Making – OR – HS/GED, 2 years of relevant post-high school, and 4 years' experience with 2 years of Operational Decision Making – OR - HS/GED, 3 years of relevant post-high school, and 3 years' experience with 1.5 years of Operational Decision Making.

Once certified, operators are required to maintain their knowledge and skills through the acquisition of continuing education units (CEUs), within each 2-year certification period:

- A minimum of 16 hours or 1.6 CEUs must meet the requirements outlined in the Association of Boards of Certification (ABC) Need-to-Know criteria;
- 4 hours or .4 CEUs are discretionary, and may include any general training, including topics not included in the ABC Need-to-Know Criteria.

The City of Troutdale employs very qualified staff who are motivated to achieve the above requirements: Training, testing and continuously seeking higher levels of professional development. Our current staff includes:

- One Certified Water Distribution Operator 3 that is also certified as a Water Treatment level 1;
- Three Certified Water Distribution Operator 2's;
- One Certified Water Distribution Operator 1;
- One Chief Operator that is applying for his Water Distribution Operator 3 certification exam;
- One Laborer that has applied for his exam to become a Certified Water Distribution Operator 1.

There are several state and federally-mandated programs that must be carried out in order to maintain compliance with drinking water regulations. Operations staff complete tasks related to these programs to produce, monitor, test, maintain, manage, regulate, and answer questions about the valuable groundwater resource delivered daily to your home or business. All of our water system operators are happy to serve and are dedicated to providing excellent customer service.



On Thursday, May 12th, 65 employees from just one office of the Keller Williams Realty company took a day off work to spend clearing brush, removing invasive plants and rebuilding the walking trail at Columbia Park. Where Does Your Water Come From?

Troutdale water comes from seven City-owned-and-operated groundwater wells within City limits that are drilled to various depths ranging between 485 and 697 feet. The water is provided from two aquifers, known hydrologically as the Sand & Gravel Aquifer and the Troutdale Sandstone Aquifer.

From Gresham Fire: Use Your Fireworks Safely!



Every year fireworks ignite hundreds of fires in Oregon. Fires on roofs, in shrubs, bark dust, and on decks are common and can damage your home and injure your family.

What's Illegal

- Fireworks that fly into the air, explode, act unpredictably or move more than 12 feet on the ground are illegal in Oregon. Firecrackers, bottle rockets and roman candles are illegal. If it goes airborne, spins around, or acts erratically, it's likely illegal.
- It's against the law to make or modify fireworks in Oregon.
- Possession of illegal fireworks is a Class B misdemeanor and carries a \$1,500 fine.
- Fireworks and explosives are not allowed in any City of Troutdale park or open space.

Stay Safe

- Use only legal fireworks.
- Use fireworks only in legal places (not on beaches, parks and state and federal forest land).
- Store fireworks out of children's reach.
- Always keep your pets indoors.
- Always have a garden hose or a bucket of water on hand.
- Never re-light a "dud" firework; wait 10-15 minutes, then soak in a bucket of water.
- Discard firework debris in a non-combustible container.

Imagination Station Update: Two town hall meetings were held in May to gather input from the public on the direction we will take to rebuild the burned-out section of Imagination Station. Historical Sculpture Unveiled in New 'Visionary Park'



On June 7th, Troutdale celebrated a brief moment in history as renowned sculptor Rip Caswell unveiled "Devoted Passion", a tribute to visionaries Samuel Lancaster and Samuel Hill who were instrumental in building the first planned scenic highway. The monument commemorates the 100th Anniversary of the opening of the scenic Columbia River Highway. The monument is located at the new *Visionary Park*, on the corner of Jackson Park Road and Historic Columbia River Highway. The park is currently under construction and completion is planned for this September.



Swim Safely This Summer



The American Medical Response (AMR) River Rescue program provides lifeguard services on the Sandy River at **Glenn Otto Park** every day from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m., beginning Memorial Day through Labor Day.

AMR River Rescue wants swimmers to **"Play it safe - wear a lifejacket!"**

- Wear a US Coast Guard approved life jacket.
- Be aware of the hazards (cold shock and strong currents can weaken even the strongest swimmers).
- Know your abilities - "If you can't swim - Don't go in!"
- Keep children within arm's reach and provide constant supervision.
- Children should wear a life jacket *in or around water*
- Never swim alone - swim with a buddy.
- Learn to swim, and learn CPR.
- Don't fight the current, face downstream and look for a calm place to get out.
- Don't swim or boat while under the influence of alcohol or drugs.

NOTE: Flotation devices are available for daily use at Glenn Otto Park. AMR has approximately 75 life jackets to "loan" in all sizes from infant to adults. You'll need to show your driver's license to receive a life jacket for you or your family.
