Project Update: Troutdale to Gresham Trail Master Plan

Metro is leading a master planning effort to identify options to complete a major gap in the regional 40-Mile Loop project. In coordination with the City of Troutdale, the City of Gresham, and other stakeholders, the Troutdale to Gresham Trail project aims to identify potential routes and receive community feedback on route alternatives, design opportunities, and related issues or concerns.

To date, Metro has engaged in public outreach efforts, with an “open house” gathering at Mount Hood Community College on June 29th and information tables at community events, including the Gresham Farmers Market and at July’s SummerFest in Glenn Otto Park. Though there have been some preliminary options presented for feedback, no formal action or approvals have occurred, with planning efforts continuing into the fall months.

What is Developing Downtown?

Two prominent developments continue to mature in downtown Troutdale. Most obvious is the completion of five townhouses on the “Discovery Block” on 2nd Avenue. Another five townhouses should begin construction soon, as the sales of the first five were brisk. The retail and office spaces on the Historic Highway will be the third phase.

Another development is the Calcagno Cellars property (at right) located at 336 East Historic Columbia River Highway, whose owners, Frank and Kristi Calcagno are transforming into a wine cellar and tasting room (see photo). The building formerly housed River Trails, a local whitewater outfitting business, and before that was the West Columbia Gorge Chamber of Commerce/Visitors Center office. Calcagno Cellars should be open in the fall.



On April 9, 2016, arsonists burned down approximately 1/3 of this unique playground, and the resulting loss has had a significant emotional impact on our community. The portion of the structure which was destroyed was generously removed at no cost shortly after the fire by volunteers from the local contractor Konell Construction and Demolition. Subsequently, more than \$7,500 in donations were received by the City from 30 individuals and organizations, further illustrating enthusiastic community support for Imagination Station. Thank you for your generous support! Subsequent to the fire there were a number and variety of community meetings considering the potential restoration options.

Imagination Station 2.0!

YOU will have the opportunity to help build the new Imagination Station version 2.0!

These included the monthly Parks Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings, and a “design day” involving 450+ Troutdale elementary school children and gathering their input, with an evening wrap-up meeting for the parents. The PAC also held Town Hall meetings on May 18th and 21st to gather community input, and on July 29th and 30th the PAC manned a booth at the Bite of East County to gather additional volunteers and donations.

There has been considerable community passion, enthusiasm and support expressed for some of the potential repair options, however the public discourse has not been aware of all of the factors that weigh on the Council’s decision. There are some who have expressed frustration that the repair has not already been completed, however, the complexity of factors to be considered, including the expenditure of public funds, current safety and ADA standards, and the deterioration of the legacy structure which is in need of another \$200,000 of repairs, require a more deliberate process.

After carefully considering all the many factors and public input, at the July 12, 2016 Council meeting, the PAC unanimously recommended that

the entire Imagination Station play structure be replaced. At the August 9, 2016 City Council meeting after more than two hours of presentations, public comment, and discussion of the many factors involved, the Council unanimously approved the PAC’s recommendation that the entire Imagination Station play structure be replaced.

The Council, PAC and the community all want to preserve the spirit of our existing Imagination Station which is well known and well loved by families throughout East Multnomah County. The 2.0 version structure will maintain the same theme and style, with similar colors and features which help make Imagination Station unique and beloved. The new structure will implement current safety and ADA standards providing a more inclusive play area for all children.



The City of Troutdale appreciates your generous efforts to donate funds and provide services to the City for the restoration of the Imagination Station playground. The City continues to accept donations at City Hall, 219 East Historic Columbia River Highway, Troutdale, Oregon 97060, and will provide receipts for donations received that may qualify as deductible under federal income tax provisions. The City has also received many offers to provide professional services and materials as well as volunteer time to restore Imagination Station.

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Utility Rates Increase in Troutdale, Yet Remain Lower than Most Municipalities

In May, 2016, in accordance with Troutdale Municipal Code, the City Council approved a request to increase all utility rates by 4 percent and increase the stormwater rate cap from \$50 to \$100 per month for nonresidential accounts. These increases went into effect on July 1, 2016.

Even with this increase, the City of Troutdale's utility rates remain significantly lower than most other Portland Metropolitan area cities enjoy.

The City of Troutdale takes its responsibility to provide safe clean drinking water, protect the environment and protect property from local flooding seriously; however, costs of personnel, materials, services, and projects continue to increase. The City has also completed and adopted its new Master Plans for each utility. In support of these plans and the growing



need for action, a thorough financial analysis of all of the utility funds was recently completed with the assistance of economic analysis specialists, to estimate the impact of escalating operation and maintenance costs, capital projects and establishing reserves for system reinvestment.

The results of that analysis are clear. The City needs to build reserves to cover the cost of future projects that will be needed to maintain components of the system as they age. Additionally there are important upgrades for earthquake retrofitting, and to meet current fire-fighting standards that will require significant expenditures. Some of these needs are in the near future, and some can be held off a few years.

There are, however, important water, sewer and stormwater system rehabilitation projects that are needed immediately but have been delayed for multiple years due to lack of available capital in their respective funds. To manage surface disruptions and minimize property damage and injuries to the public and our staff, many of these systems must be replaced prior to failure.

We know that our citizens understand and support the need for continuing investment in preventative maintenance as well as new investment in the systems that provide Troutdale with clean water, control flooding, manage waste, and keep our streets safe. And we greatly appreciate that support as we strive to provide excellent stewardship of the infrastructure that will allow all of these systems to continue seamlessly into the future.

To be eligible to renew a certificate, an operator is required to accumulate a minimum of two (2.0) continuing education units (CEU) or equivalent, or two hours of community college, college or university credit during the two years leading up to the certificate's two-year expiration date. One CEU equals 10 contact hours of participation in an organized continuing education experience under responsible sponsorship, capable direction and qualified instruction. CEUs or credit must have direct application to wastewater system (collection or treatment) operator job tasks and required knowledge. Continuing education promotes professional growth, helps ensure that operators maintain their skills in keeping with changing technology and regulations, and ultimately enhances safe and effective practices in the field.

Thanks to Shawn and all his coworkers who are also certified at class levels 1-4 for the great job they do 24/7 protecting our health, property and the environment.

Shawn Anderson was recently promoted to Chief Operator at Troutdale's Water Pollution Control Facility. In May, Shawn completed and passed his Class 4 certification exam, consisting of 100 questions and administered by the State of Oregon Department of Environmental Quality. Oregon law requires owners of wastewater systems and drinking water systems (public and private) to have their systems under the responsible control and direction of certified operators. Based on the City size and complexity of the Water Pollution Control Facility, the City is required to have an employee with a Class 4 certificate, the highest level required by the State. Trained and certified operators are necessary to ensure that the systems are managed in a manner that fully protects public health and the environment.

Lead and Copper Levels Below The Limit

Samples were recently collected from Troutdale parks and City buildings



The City of Troutdale takes its responsibility for providing high quality drinking water seriously, but we cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. As a precaution the City recently collected samples from drinking fountains at City parks and publicly-owned buildings. If a drinking fountain was not available, sampling was done from an interior fixture. We are very pleased to report that all of the lead and copper test results from park drinking fountains and City facilities were below action levels set by the EPA. We found one location that was close to the limit, and while not required, we have taken that fixture out of

service. If you are concerned that your water may contain high lead levels, there are steps you can take to reduce the potential risks. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes with cold water before drinking or cooking. A certified plumber can check for lead solders and pipes in your household plumbing and identify any fixtures that contain lead. The only way to know with certainty if you have lead in your water at the tap is to have it tested by a certified laboratory. Currently, every three years the City works with residents to test

inside 30 homes. Lead levels have consistently been found to be very low in Troutdale, and more frequent testing or action have not been necessary.

If you want to know more about your drinking water, the City publishes and distributes a Water Quality Report each year in July that summarizes the quality of water in Troutdale. To Pokémon GO Enthusiasts: Your Safety Counts First



Whether you play, or just watch those who play - be mindful of the safety risks and hazards

Occasionally, Multnomah County Sheriff's Deputies encounter the not-so-ordinary service call. Incidents such as the recent discovery of a mysterious large turtle located in a citizen's back yard can provide for an interesting shift for a Deputy. Recently, there has been a new world-wide phenomenon that has generated many unusual calls for service – Pokémon GO.

According to Wikipedia.org, Pokémon GO is a free-to-play, location-based, augmented reality game developed for IOS and Android devices (smartphones). The game was released in July 2016 and utilizes a mobile device's GPS capabilities to locate, capture, battle and train virtual creatures called "Pokémon", who appear on the screen as if they were in the same real-world location as the player.

Recently, Deputies have responded to various Pokémon GO-related calls for service that began as "suspicious activity" incidents but resulted in Deputies contacting enthusiastic players of the game.

With its challenging, competitive and entertaining qualities, it's easy to understand the lure of this popular game. However, there have been some Pokémon GO-related incidents that prompt a safety message as well. Playing Pokémon GO has been a contributing factor in injury and non-injury traffic accidents (vehicle, bicycle, skateboarders attempting to locate Pokémon), reported burglaries (players entering private property to locate Pokémon) and even suspects luring victims to Pokémon locations to steal from them. Unfortunately, the game has also contributed to serious accidents involving players falling from cliffs and buildings.

The Pokemon.com website provides safety information for players and parents. The Multnomah County Sheriff's Office encourages residents and visitors to Troutdale who play - or watch those who enjoy this game - to be mindful of potential hazards and watchful of Pokémon players.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Two-class series, October 20th and 27th. Look in our Fall Recreation Guide, out September 14th. Pre-registration is required and seating is limited.

The recent region-wide "Cascadia Rising" earthquake exercise reminded all of us that we are living in a seismically active area. Unfortunately, a really big earthquake is only one of many hazards that Troutdale residents and businesses need to be aware of and prepare for. Much more likely but less severe emergencies also threaten Troutdale, such as winter storms, floods, and fires, just to name a few.

Preparedness begins with understanding your risks, and from that foundation you can build your personal plan to protect yourself, your family, and your business. The City of Troutdale and Multnomah County are offering a free two-class series, "Disaster Preparedness". These two classes will cover disaster awareness and

Project Update: New Flood Insurance Rate Maps

The Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has informed jurisdictions along the Sandy River drainage basin that Flood Insurance Rate Maps (also known as FIRMs or "flood maps") will be updated next year to reflect hydrological changes and technical improvements in mapping special flood hazard areas (SFHAs, commonly called flood zones). FEMA held two public open houses in June to discuss the re-mapping project and offered attendees the chance to review their property's situation and how any map changes may affect them.

Property owners who currently pay flood insurance and/or are in proximity to the Sandy River and Beaver Creek should review the current draft maps, which have been uploaded to the City's website and are also available for review at the Planning and Building offices at 2200 SW 18th Way. Please contact the Planning Department at planning@troutdaleoregon.gov or call 503-674-7228 to arrange an appointment to review maps.

The public has the right to submit comments or file an appeal on the draft maps or the corresponding Flood Insurance Study (FIS). At the time of this publication, the appeal period is expected to open on September 1st and would close on or around November 30th. Please check the City's website at www.troutdaleoregon.gov, or call 503-674-7228 for continued updates as more information is presented.
